His talk will explain how the Appalachian Trail began as the vision of one man, how the trail has evolved over the decades, what his hike from Georgia to Maine was like, and what the Georgia Appalachian Trail Club and other volunteer clubs do to maintain the A. T. that is now famous with long-distance hikers throughout the world.
